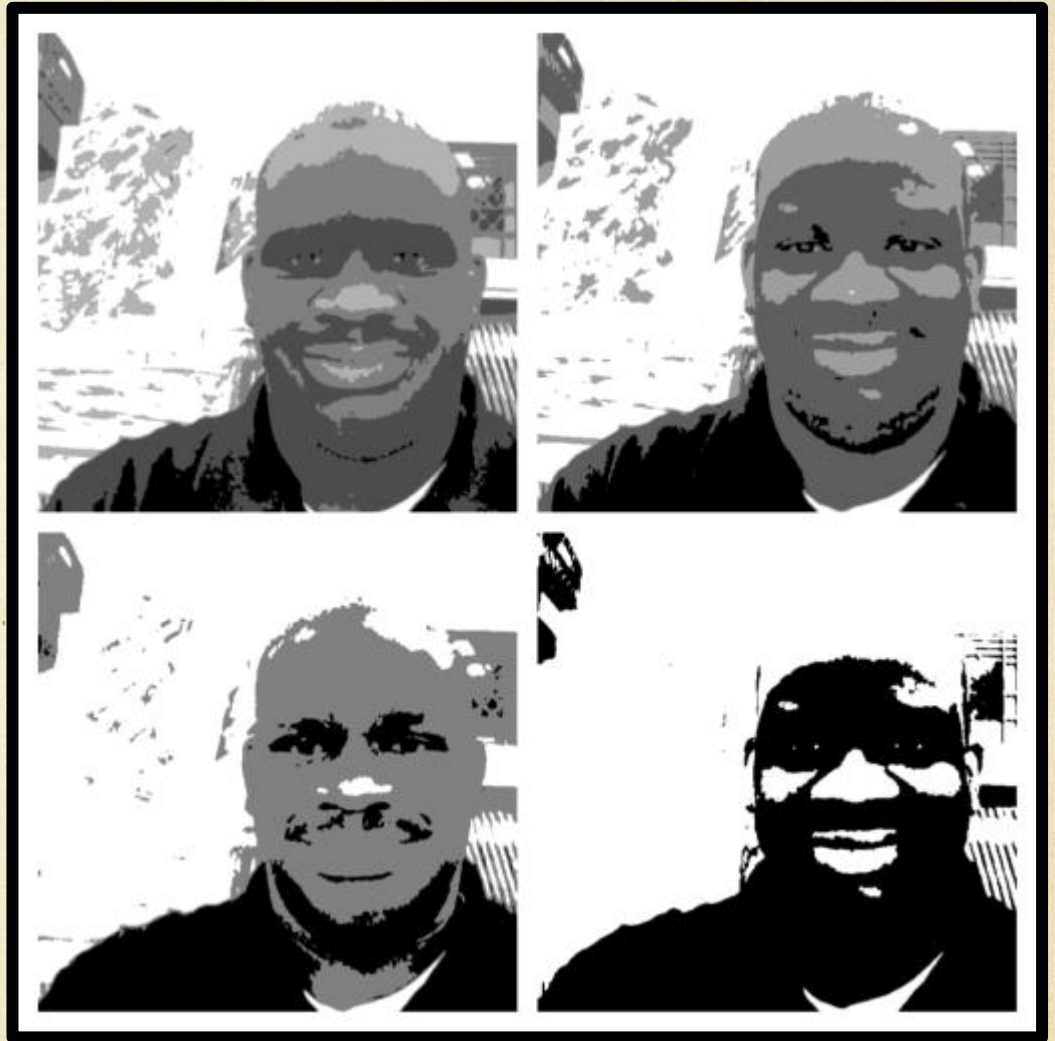


What we see is what we get?
